In the midst of economic uncertainty, we started our fiscal year 2022-2023 with continued compassion for what our children, families, providers, and staff were experiencing with the effects of COVID-19. Meeting them where they were at, we prioritized their health, safety, and childcare needs. We accepted the challenges and maintained our commitment to strengthen low-income working families, promote high-quality early care for children of all abilities, develop knowledgeable early care providers, and promote economically resilient communities.

By the end of the fiscal year, we saw an increase of families impacted by our subsidized childcare programs. In this annual report, you'll read about two parents who found economic opportunities as a result of their eligibility in our subsidized programs. Providers discovered new ways to manage their business, understand trauma and its symptoms, and found camaraderie with their peers, as noted by a childcare professional who shared her story. Strategic partners continued to be engaged, participating at our signature events hosted by our Family Engagement program and exchanging information and resources.

Our elected officials at all levels were open to learning more about equitable compensation for our childcare providers, advocating for increased work rates for our providers. To that end, we continued to prioritize the childcare industry, moving forward to ensure a true economic recovery for everyone we serve.

Celebrating our 45th anniversary, we gathered to honor our founder, share the state of child care and early childhood education, and embrace the work ahead to advance our goals. In partnership with Metro, we announced an expansion of our programs with the Pathways LA Child Development Center, located near Union Station next to Metro headquarters, that we began operating in June.

Thanks to our community partners, civic leaders, donors, providers, families, and staff, who remain committed to our mission, Pathways LA will continue to press forward, fulfilling our mission and leading with compassion.

Pathways LA Historical Timeline

Pathways LA launched the **Resource & Action Project**. The project provided

technical assistance to Head Start and other early care programs to improve services for children with disabilities and to support their families.



Pathways LA demonstrated best practices for comprehensive services in center-based programs by establishing the **West Hollywood Preschool**, in partnership with the City of West Hollywood and LA County Office of Education.



The **Alternative Payment** program was also established.

We changed our name from Child and Family Services to **Pathways LA**.

Pathways LA led the five-year countywide

effort, the Special Needs Advisory Project, to train and support early care providers to better meet the needs of children with disabilities in their programs.

Children and Family Support

Being Compassionate to Families' Childcare Needs

Unemployed and with two children, Arianda Resendiz was referred to Pathways LA by the Department of Children and Family Services social worker. She qualified for the Alternative Payment program that provides free or reduced-cost childcare assistance.

We believe every family should have access to quality child care, regardless of income. To that end, Pathways LA helps low-income families pay for child care so they can pursue their educational and career goals. Each year we work to reach more community members with services such as child care, childcare provider training and workshops, referrals and resources for families and care providers, and much more.

"When I found out I qualified for the AP program, I took the opportunity to go and find work," Arianda said. Her first job was a cashier at the 99 cent store. Now, she provides compassionate work, serving individuals in adult home care.

Pathways LA Child Care Payment and Assistance Programs serve eligible families by providing subsidies and services for children from birth through age 13 (up to age 21 for children with exceptional needs), funding permitting. These programs, which are designed to support low-income parents with child care, include CalWORKs Stage 1 and the California Department of Education programs: Stage 2, Stage 3, Alternative Payment, and Berendo Program.

"I now have economic stability. I'm very grateful for the help Pathways LA has provided these past seven years," Arianda said.

Engaging Families in a Compassionate Environment

At Pathways LA, we go beyond just childcare assistance. We understand that parents are a child's first teachers, so our Family Engagement Program works closely with parents and caregivers to promote healthy child development and solid parent-child relationships.

Cristina Mauricio began receiving childcare assistance for her children aged 2 and 9 three years ago at the start of the pandemic. She reallocated the money she would have spent on child care to buy household necessities like food and medicine. Besides the childcare subsidy she receives, Cristina benefits from the numerous programs we offer families such as parent education and training, play and learn groups, parent cafes, family events, and systems navigation that connects families with community resources.

From workshops on how to discipline and manage your children's behavior to mental and emotional well-being, Cristina makes the most of the programs and events that provide additional support, resources, and activities for the children.

Our Family Engagement Program is designed to support children's and families well-being. We use a strengths-based approach that focuses on building on the positive aspects of families, and we follow the Strengthening Families Framework, which includes five protective factors such as resilience in parents, social connections, support during difficult times, knowledge about parenting and child development, and social-emotional skills for children. These protective factors are essential for healthy child development and family well-being.

Project Innovations LA, in partnership with Para Los Niños, is a community-driven collaborative to help support and cultivate bonds to heal trauma. To make an impact for improved well-being, the Play Strong Strategies are:

- Think Out Loud: using children's words as communication
- ▲ Make Yourself a Mirror: building a heart to heart connection
- Bring Emotions to Life: understanding and accepting feelings
- Love Surface Area: physical affection and praise to build self-esteem
- Flexible Yes: a safe and empathetic limit setting
- Be the Safe Container: reduce fight or flight stress response
- Dial Intensity Up or Down: keeping the body in balance
- Make Empathy Your Superpower: compassion for others and self care
- Build Grit: build frustration tolerance, invite challenge and risk
- ▲ Shift to Solution Focus: creative resourceful problem solving
- Narrate to Integrate: telling the story of strength to repair

Showing Compassion to Childcare Providers

Childcare professionals are the cornerstone to high-quality early childhood education. And Diana Montiel, owner of Montiel Cajina Family Child Care, knows well the support needed to apply best practices in her field. For the past 16 years, Diana has received training, resources, and professional development.

Pathways LA offers trainings and professional development opportunities to licensed childcare providers, childcare center staff, and any family, friend or neighbor providing childcare services. Topics include Child Growth and Development, Trauma-Informed Care, Business Development, Children with Special Needs, Nutrition and much more. We collaborate with the California Early Care & Education Workforce Registry, which tracks and promotes the education, training and experience of the early care and education workforce in order to improve professionalism and positively impact children.

Most impactful for Diana was the pandemic. "We don't have to end care because a family is not able to pay. They go above and beyond to not only support families but also providers," said Diana. One example she shared was the pandemic. Pathways LA provided materials, equipment, hand sanitizer, face masks and other items. "We were well taken care of, so we can provide services to families who still needed our services."

She particularly enjoys the events with other providers, "allowing us to gather in groups and helping us focus on emotional and mental support as providers, so we can give back better to our communities." They discuss issues they are having in their day care and find solutions together, including sharing tips that help their businesses grow.

Family Child Care Home Education Network (FCCHEN) supports the quality of child care for family childcare home providers. Coaches conduct visits to FCCHEN providers where they use the Desired Results Developmental Profile assessment tool and the Family Child Care Environmental Rating Scale to evaluate and improve the quality of care.


